And how are those resolutions going? Many people say that it only takes about three weeks to find out whether these new adoptions will

truly stick or crumble. Are you at that

point?



For myself, the passage into 2019 brought to mind changes in my own life I would like to make. Like some of you, I'm old enough now to have recycled a number of thoughts or resolutions from the past and have become wise enough to know or predict how realistic these resolutions might become in the New Year. This conversation within my own mind often turns into an argument of kinds between searching for a more refined realistic resolution and simply abandoning the thought of creating resolutions for change in the first place. And then I began to reflect on the words from my previous month's article in Connections. I quoted the Psalmist. "Be still and know I am God. I will be exalted among the nations. I will be exalted in the earth." Psalm 46:10

With that thought, this conversation about resolutions within my own mind began to quieten. The arguments that my mind was spinning about slowed and my perspective seemed renewed. My life is not my own. My life is a gift from God. It's on loan. Every moment of this new 2019 year is a gift from God. The argument changed in my mind from what do I want to change or resolve to rather what does God want for my life in this New Year. How does God want to use me? Who will I become? I began to think about the word stewardship and how that might look like for me in 2019. How does that look like for you in 2019? What does that look like for us at All Saints?

I know from working with members of the Church Council that they share this perspective. It is good to have a point in time, perhaps the New Year, to slow ones thoughts down and revisit this perspective of stewardship. The perspective of Council is that it does not serve its own purpose but rather God's purpose working through the congregation of All Saints. This is underlined and detailed in our Constitution. I can once again commit to you in 2019 that Council will prayerfully carry out that role to the best of our abilities. With a New Year upon us, I pray that all of us will discern what is the will of God for our own lives in service and fuse our efforts at All Saints to serve God's purpose.

Council, at the point of my writing this, has not met since the end of November. Our next meeting is January 30th. With this in mind, our efforts continue to address a number of issues I reported previously.

Establishment of a Privacy Policy for All Saints Lutheran Anglican Church. You will hear more about this in January-February. A new policy was passed and a new permission form re use of personal information including photos taken within the church will be distributed to the congregation.

A biblical world view of stewardship can be consciously defined as: "Utilizing and managing all resources God provides for the glory of God and the betterment of His creation."

- Work on a revised Building Policy Use. This has now been directed to the Finance Team for further input.
- Revisiting the present building rentals, space, etc. We are presently looking at our longerterm rentals both within our mandate of Outreach and outside users.
- Research and submit an application for possible funding of accessible power door for the outside of the church. We have submitted a grant application to the Anglican Niagara Diocese for possible funds. Over the holidays, we received notice that this was denied. We will take next steps to access possible provincial and federal government funding.
- Budget for 2019. This was passed during our Congregation/Vestry meeting in December.
- Establishing a fund-raising task force for the possible electronic church sign on Silvercreek. If it is to happen, one half the cost is to be raised from church members. There is a small leadership team from Council willing to carry this interest forward. I'm sure they would welcome help with this. Look forward to hearing from them in the New Year. This has essentially turned into a fund-raising project if we are to see it to fruition.
- Looking at what do outreach projects at All Saints look like.... how are they established, organized, funded, space needed, etc. This was discussed at the November meeting and a proposal will be introduced at the end of January.
- Reviewing of monthly team and committee reports.
- Bringing the use of the Ogilvie bequest funds to completion. The narthex floor has now been completed. Expansion of the organ resources now being planned and implemented soon, and the installation of the commercial dishwasher in the kitchen being worked on as we speak.

Aside from the above, mention too must be made to all within Council and other staff and volunteers who have stepped up to fill in the many responsibilities that many of us don't see or assume while Pastor Jeff continues his rehabilitation from surgery. It is always a dangerous task to begin listing those in light that others might be overlooked.

Special thanks must go to Jan Nielson for coordinating our ushers as well as keeping the Worship and Music Team running during the Christmas Season. This team plays an important role in keeping the organization of our regular worship services together. Thank you to Peter West and the choir for being flexible as to the needs of each service during this special time. A special thank you must be extended to Jennifer in our office for going beyond the call of duty. Without Pastor's immediate direction, she has excelled in keeping the hub of our business operations together. Thank you to Sandra Christie for once again maintaining our financial transition from one year to the next with the issuing of new offering envelopes and tax receipts. Thank you to Kathryn Smith who despite not officially being on the Worship and Music Team, continued to provide important guidance on our worship experience.

As of this date, Pastor Jeff will begin to return to active service February 10th. This no doubt will be a gradual progression. Until then, please direct all immediate concerns to myself at 519-824-5469. From my point of view as Chair of Council, I am extremely proud of how we as All Saints have pulled together over the last couple of months... particularly during a festive season. Despite a few challenges, God has truly blessed us and dare I say, made us stronger. Continue to share those blessings with our neighbours.

Calling all the Baptized!

Sunday worship is everybody's responsibility and joy.

Our congregation is expanding the ministry of laypeople preparing and offering the prayers of intercession (also called the prayers of the people) in worship. They are everybody's prayers. This congregation, All Saints, takes the priesthood of all believers literally and seriously.

The purpose of these prayers which are offered after the sermon is to truly "intercede" on behalf of all in need (the church, earth, creatures, nations, all humans, and everything else!). Ideally, these prayers are prepared during the week by someone in the congregation and led by a lay leader (not the pastor).

A two-day training opportunity for new and returning intercessors will be offered on Sunday, February 24 and Sunday, March 3 from 11:30 to 1:00.

The best preparation is a life of prayer. No other experience necessary.

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Silvercreek Community Market Update

Thank you to everyone who has been part of the many fundraising efforts for the Market over the Christmas season, especially the Cookie Walk which raised just over \$2,300.00 and the employees and owners of Capital Paving who raised \$2,000.00 for the Market. Thank you also to the private donations and the congregation for their ongoing financial support.

In 2018 the cost for fresh produce purchased was \$10,867.50. This food was distributed to **5311 people** (1946 of whom were children). That works out to about \$2.00 per person/market, which was made possible by purchasing our fresh produce at wholesale prices through The Seed (Guelph Community Health Centre). We still average between 50-60 families attending each Market and I am happy to report that our Market costs will be covered for 2019! We are now working on funds for 2020.



"Best before dates" are found on most packaged food items produced in Canada. Using the guidelines for Canadian Food Banks, we do not give out non-perishable food items that



have exceeded the best before date or items that do not have a date stamped on them. When we empty the food basket each Sunday (or after a food drive) these items usually end up in the garbage unless someone wants to take them home. It would be a tremendous help to us if everyone would check the best before dates of non-perishable food items you are donating before you bring them to church. If you cannot find a date (for example, food produced outside Canada may not have them, food purchased in bulk packages may have them on the case but not the individual items) we cannot give to our guests. Thank you!

Also, thank you to everyone who continues to bring in non-perishable items! We have also received support in this area from Capital Paving who held a food drive as part of their Christmas fundraising and from St. Joseph's RC congregation who held a food drive in December. These partnerships help us extend what we collect at All Saints each week and last for several months. As a result, we will be having an **All Saints Lenten Food Drive to** help fill in the gaps on the most popular food items that we always need. Please continue in your non-perishable food support but listed below are the items we are most in need of and which will be the focus of the Lenten Food Drive:

March 10	Breakfast cereal and peanut butter	March 31	Canned fruit and vegetables
March 17	Jasmine rice and dry red lentils	April 7	Cereal and peanut butter
March 24	Pasta and pasta sauce (please no KD!)	April 14	Pasta sauce and Jasmine rice


committee, set up a live


trap with peanut butter and checked the trap at least twice a day for almost a week. However,
