

Many times when I sit in my office, preparing a sermon, writing a newsletter article, planning a confirmation lesson, or doing the usual computer work, my eyes turn to my bookshelf for inspiration. I look for a particular title of a book written by a familiar author or I search for a resource that has stories, humorous or serious, something that will capture the mood I want to reflect on. Every now and then my eyes turn to the section I have on jokes and funny antidotes that my father passed on

to me many years ago. They bring back many memories of days gone by.

Throughout history, authors have remembered events, individuals or many persons, through oral and written pieces. The writers try to capture the state of the moment, good or bad, for others to understand and value. This has taken place through poetry, stories, photography or painting, just to name a few expressions of the arts. They capture our imaginations and

incite us to continue to tell the stories of the past. From an entertainment value, how many of us can recall a children's book because of the way someone read it to us or reading it to ourselves under blankets or in a tent with a flashlight. Our minds and our imaginations are incredible things.

In the month of April and May, stories and narratives will be shared as we ponder the love of God in our world, past and present, especially during Holy Week and Easter. During that time, we will hear at the Maundy Thursday Seder and Service, words from Exodus 13: 3, "Moses said to the people, 'Remember this day on which you came out of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, because the Lord brought you out from there by strength of hand; no leavened bread shall be eaten." We are called to remember these stories to help us on our present faith journey.

On Good Friday, we will reflect and meditate on the Stations of the Cross and the death of Jesus. I find this to be an important part of the Holy Week experience as it enables me to remember what Jesus went through and the hope we have in his death. Sin and death are no more. This is comforting to me as it was a year ago that my younger brother died during Holy Week and I need to remember and to know the Lord is my Shepherd. Powerful words to hear and live by.

Easter Sunday is always exciting as we bring back the Alleluia's that we have not said during the 40 days of the Lenten season. What a joy to know that our worshipping community, with others around the world, will lift up our voices in praise and thanksgiving, knowing that Christ has died, Christ has risen, and Christ will come again. Now that is something worth remembering.

Finally on that subject of remembering, we read from the Song of Moses before his death in Deuteronomy 32: 7, "Remember the days of old, consider the years long past; ask your father, and he will inform you; your elders, and they will tell you." In May, we will hear the living story of who and what ministry we as God's people have contributed and participated in through the written Reports presented at our Annual General / Vestry meeting. I always find this to be inspiring time as we hear about what God is doing in our lives. History is being recorded so that the story can be told and retold by our elders and "family members" for the generations to come. My prayer as we gather together at our Meeting is that we do so in the Spirit of our Creator God,

The POM project to supply girls and young women living in the Third World with reusable period protection to enable them to go to school, is active in our community. At intervals, we have a group sewing bee when we cut out pattern pieces and then many sewers take parts home to make pretty cotton bags and the colourful reusable pads at home.

Recently, at March break, 3 high school sewing teachers led a trip to Nicaragua to establish sewing collectives for women to make various projects including POM pads. Thanks to Robin Smart, we were able to send down an additional sewing machine which was very appreciated and the funding for our project provided wages for women to

make the pads which were then distributed to young women who needed the security and opportunity provided by daily school attendance.

Our church was also able to send down much needed fabric, soap, pretty new underwear, ziplock baggies, attractive kit bags in cheerful colours and small reusable discreet carry cases thanks to hard work of our sewers and the kindness of our supporters.

What is the Passover Seder?

The Seder meal is a festive meal.

On Maundy Thursday, when we as a Christian community celebrate the Seder, we acknowledge the Jewish roots of our Eucharistic faith and participate as a community in a feast in the same way Christ presided over the Last Supper with his disciples. In Jesus' day everyone wined and dined with the finest foods. Jesus and his disciples were celebrating a key article of the Jewish faith, the escape of the Israelites from Egypt under the leadership of

Moses. God had promised Moses that the Israelites would be delivered from slavery under the Pharaoh and also promised that one day they would have their own land.

The Seder follows a prescribed order of ritual food elements, prayers and readings. The Seder plate contains a shank bone of a lamb symbolic of the Paschal Lamb; the sweet haroset symbolic of the mortar used in building; the bitter herbs (radish slices) to represent the harsh labour of the slaves; the parsley dipped in salt water to symbolize

captive peoples; the roasted eggs symbolic of sacrifice in biblical

times and the unleavened matzoh, food for the journey. Sips of wine are drunk as a symbol of joy and God's

promise of redemption.

On Maundy Thursday we meet as God's people, listen to the story, share the festive foods and remember God's promises to us. Following the meal (which is eaten in haste) we gather for the washing of hands and feet in service to each other in the name of God's love.



Nominations for Members of Congregational Council

Generally, four new members of the Congregational Council are elected at each Annual Congregational/Vestry Meeting which is usually held on the first Sunday of May each year. To ensure the process is open, we are again requesting nominations for these four positions. Nominations can be for someone else, with their consent, or one can nominate themselves.

Who is eligible to be on the Congregational Council?

Any voting member of All Saints Lutheran Anglican Church is eligible. Voting members are those baptized members who have, for at least six months preceding the holding of a Vestry/Annual meeting, been involved with the congregation through worship, fellowship and financial support, and have attained the age of 15 years.



Who is selected to be on the

The names of those people who agree to be on Council (nominations) are put forward to the Congregation at the Annual Meeting in May. A vote is then taken to select the four required each year.

What do the members of the Congregational Council do?

This is a very good question! First and foremost, the members act on behalf of the Congregation. They represent the congregation and have a general oversight of the life and activities of the church ensuring that everything is done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith practice of the ACC and the ELCIC. Most of the Council serve in a liaison or communication position to other teams and committees in the church which can generally handled through email. Council

members also assist in counting offerings usually 4 times per year with the assistance of another experienced counter. Those in an executive position have additional duties.

How much time is involved? Reading the above, one might assume a considerable time is required. In reality, actual time required can be less than serving the church in other capacities. A member of Council generally serves for three years. Meetings are held **once per month** except in the summertime and December. Meetings usually include a brief devotional time, followed by a meeting that lasts about two hours. Preparation for meetings include reading the previous minutes, reports from the various committees, and contemplating items on the agenda. The chairperson, vice chairperson, and secretary have

additional duties.

Remember, what Jesus commissioned us to do is what He demonstrated. Involvement in the ministry of All Saints as a Council member can spiritually be a life giving experience.

Guidelines for Outreach and Fundraising Activities

All Saints Lutheran Anglican Church, Guelph

To request new fundraising events or outreach activities:

- Send a request by email or letter to the church.
- The Administrative Assistant will forward all requests to the chairs of the executive council and the outreach committee, and will copy the pastor or priest.
- If the request is for a fundraising event, the executive chair will present it to the executive at the next meeting, or will share it by email if time-sensitive.
- If the request is for a new outreach activity, the outreach chair will share the information with the outreach committee. The committee will recommend to the executive council to support or decline the request, and will explain the reasons for their recommendation.

Fundraising

- The church will permit fundraising promotion and activities for charities supported by All Saints, the Evangelical Church of Canada, or the Anglican Church in Canada.
- Church members may use the coffee hour to raise funds for other charities, without requesting permission in advance. (Council will take note of any concerns, and re-assess this policy after one year.)
- Council welcomes church members to promote fundraising activities for outside organizations on the bulletin board and in the church newsletter, but not through announcements in church.

Outreach

- Organizers of outreach activities will need to request any minor changes to booking details through the church secretary, who will consult with the executive council.
- Organizers of outreach activities that have not been approved may promote these activities through the bulletin board and the church newsletter, but not through announcements in church.

Message from the Zytner's to the Soehner's, while in Germany **Excerpts Shared with Permission**

Date: Sun, 17 Mar 2019 — Hello from Germany:

We are home again after two nights away. I had a business meeting in Leipzig at the Federal Environmental Research Centre, UFZ Friday morning. This Centre is also directly connected to the Universität Leipzig. I wrote this long...... email as I had time on the almost 6 h ride home. Things were fresh in my mind and interesting (at least to Linda and I) so I decided to share. Leipzig: Leipzig was surprisingly nice as we were never here before. Did most of our sightseeing Thursday evening. Many building survived the war as bombing was light in the city. Following are some of the pictures.



Largest train station in Europe. Reason being it served two states. Prussia and Saxony. Hence the two entrances, even though not adequately seen on the picture.



Johann Sebastian Bach's grave in St. Thomas Church. He died in Leipzig on July 28th, 1750. Who knew. At least not this baseball golf - hockey guy. The St. Thomas Church Choir started singing here in 1212.



From a historical perspective and history buff, we got to visit the place Napoleon was stopped in 1813. Called the Monument to the Battle of Nations, where several countries including Russia, Prussia, Austria and Sweden faced off against Napoleon. He lost and was forced to retreat.

Late Friday afternoon we went onto Dresden. I was there once post reunification in 1998 and Linda was not. When I was there in 1998, they were 5 years into rebuilding the Frauenkirche, which took 13 years to finish using modern technology using the original plans. What is interesting about the Frauenkirche is that it would have survived the war if the church had taken the advise of an engineer, who said to brick the windows closed. This did not happen, allowing the phosphorus incendiary materials to get into the church. The resulting high heat from the burning pews caused the sandstone to spall apart. I should note that the foundation walls were 4 m thick, with the top two domes almost 1 m each. The next interesting thing was that the East German government allowed the ruins to remain in one spot instead of being hauled away. Remember, they were anti-religion. After reunification, 20 prominent citizens of Dresden decided to raise money to rebuild. They collected about 70% of 160 million Euros needed from worldwide donations. When they started to rebuild, the archaeologists first went in see what they could find. The interesting thing I remember when first there in 1998, there was nothing built around the Frauenkirche. It was just empty space. Private investors have come to build new buildings using the original plans. As a civil engineer all quite impressive. It was neat to spend all day Saturday in Dresden, even though our tour guide said you need weeks to see everything that Dresden has to offer. Picture looking down from


