When all is said and done, Jesus is invited to break bread with them and it is in this act they realize they are in the presence of the Risen Christ.

Council Perspective

Spring has come and gone; I think. Yet, I managed to find a few moments to usher it in. A brief pause in the cool rainy weather this past season allowed me to spend a few partial days on the golf course as well as experience the outdoors on a peaceful outdoor patio such as at Bud Huth's during the men's fellowship group a week or two ago. At those times, I welcomed back those familiar and valued sounds of the returning birds and the breeze through the new foliage of spring. At these times, I valued the time I had to not only hear these sounds but truly listen about me. It is a learned gift not to be taken lightly or for granted. At these moments, I learn or often ponder to find greater truths.

When I have taken the time for a daily devotion or worshipped among others at a Sunday service, I have tried to truly listen. I believe we are not only called to read the Word but listen to the Biblical Word. It is a process of allowing the Word to seep through the filters of my own mind without reaction and allow God to speak to me. As I approach another year as Chairperson of Council, I take the same approach with others. I recently read an article from a Pastor friend, Troy Watson, years ago. He reflects with these words "As I actively listen to others, I increase my capacity to hear the still small voice of God. As I love others, I understand and experience God's love for me more clearly. I'm learning that when I let others in, I let Christ in."

As of May/June, new Council members have been elected as a response of listening to you. You have chosen your representatives to lead, plan, and do the



business of Christ's ministry at All Saints. We all take responsibility in listening. Listening to Christ's Word and with members of Council, listening to all members of our congregation. I hope that the summer may present that opportunity for you personally.

The "new" Council has met and elected an executive. Brian Janzen will serve as Chair, Mark Weigel as Vice Chair, Michele Altermann as Secretary and Sandra Christie as Treasurer, ex-officio to Council. A number of business items related to this new setup were addressed at our last meeting. A complete list of Council members is listed at the end of this article.

Other items being addressed lately include the signage of our church along Silvercreek Parkway. At the moment of this writing, our goal has pretty well been reached. We set a goal of \$14000.00 which was a generous one based on initial estimates including inflation for the cost of the sign. Two other estimates are in the process of being received and once that is completed, a final decision will be

made and construction of the project to proceed. I cautiously state that our goal has been reached depending on these final more accurate estimates.

As the Council term of 2018-19 ended, the task too of revising and drawing up policy documents for our new church as All Saints has been completed. Quite a task, not the most interesting one, but crucial for the steps ahead. Projects projected such as the organ addition are proceeding in July. The installation of the commercial dishwasher is slated to go ahead. It was delayed due to the further possible work to the countertops that require attention. One project seemed subject to the other.

Lasting repairs are being attended to by our Property Team. The flat roof of the narthex has required attention. New LED lighting is being installed as required. The lower level vertical drapes have been replaced after some 30 plus years. The legacy stained glass window in the main stairwell is also in the process of being repaired.

We welcome Canon William Thomas formally to our team. He will be providing welcomed assistance to Pastor Jeff in the reality of the needs of our new congregation. I hope you had a good read of his article in last month's Connections. Deacon Chris has now assumed many of her regular contributions of ministry as well.

Over the summer, the change over to the "new" Council will continue. Plans for the summer have been made and secured. One of our directives is to provide planning for the future. This has already begun and will continue with a dedicated retreat in September for that purpose. One of those directives is to provide Christian Education for our children and youth

and to have a program up and running for the fall. At this point, I must admit this seems to be a challenge for our congregation. The main need is human resources....in other words, teachers and a superintendent assistant willing to take charge. From my point of view as Chair, as we extend our outreach to new areas of ministry, we cannot forget some of our core commitments. If you are interested in this ministry, please contact me or Pastor Jeff.

During this summer, I look forward representing our congregation and the Eastern Lutheran Synod at the National Conference being held in Regina, Saskatchewan during July. In order to accommodate this, I will be "on the road" from July 7th for about three weeks. A visit with my son in Banff is also planned during this time. Details for the conference can be found on the ELCIC website. The role of one of our national churches cannot ever be underestimated. The ministry of worldwide partnerships and what they can achieve in that role is truly a most valuable extension of our local ministry...one that we alone cannot achieve.

Listening; to not react or filter, to consume, to learn, to love. I encourage you to keep in contact with your Council members. We try through Connections, bulletins, email blasts, website, services, etc. to keep you informed. It does require though, your response and feedback.

What's in a Sign?

Years ago in my other life, I frequently drove past a country church sign which always had a meaningful, reflective slogan. I admired the creativity that went into making it inspirational. I spent the rest of my journey thoughtfully pondering its message.

So how is our Church sign project progressing? It is on target, on track and progressing very well. As you may have read in the weekly bulletin updates, fund-raising has been an amazing success. As of the date of writing this article as it goes to press, we have raised nearly \$12,000 with one more week to go before our fund-raising ends.

Our target was to raise \$14,000, but we are close enough to move forward with obtaining firm quotes from three contractors, which will be brought before The Sign Committee and before Church

Council, in conjunction with both Finance and Property Committees, for consideration and final approval.

Once the sign details and design are established, we can work with the City of Guelph for Bylaw approval for the positioning of the sign near the street sidewalk. The contractor that we choose can then go ahead with making and installing the sign. We are still hopeful that the sign can be installed by September of this year.

I would personally like to thank each and everyone of you for your generous contributions to make this project happen. It will give All Saints a prominent "face" on Silvercreek Pkwy, so that we are a presence in the community around the Church. All of you have been most gracious in supporting this worthwhile project.


