From the Pastor's Study

Dear Members and Friends of All Saints:

I like it when our Christian calendar falls out of sync with the cultural calendar around us. This happens each year with Christmas. It helps me to distinguish between the "Christian Christmas" and the "Cultural Christmas."

The Cultural Christmas begins sometime in early November. Some say that it begins after Halloween when all the decorations in the stores change from orange and black to red, green, and white. For others, it begins following

Remembrance Day.
For others still, it
follows American
Thanksgiving. It runs
until late December.
For many of our friends
and neighbours, the
Cultural Christmas is
over by December 26.
For others, it extends to
New Years Eve, but
certainly no longer.

The themes of the Cultural Christmas include lovely images like: cold, crisp, starry

> nights; families reuniting for the holidays; memories of happy

Christmases past; and it may include holiday film favourites like "The Sound of Music," "A Christmas Carol" (or some version of Scrooge), or "It's A Wonderful Life." We all participate in the rituals and ceremonies of the Cultural Christmas because, well, we live in this culture. It's not wrong or bad to do so. The Cultural Christmas engenders wonderful feelings of warmth, generosity, kindness, and joy - all beautiful things!

As followers of Jesus, it is good to remember that, although related and similar, the Cultural Christmas and the Christian Christmas are not quite the same thing. One word best captures the theme of the Christian

Christmas: Incarnation. As the Gospel According to John puts it: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14) Or, as the angel of the Lord explained to Mary's husband Joseph, Jesus' birth would be as was spoken by the prophet Isaiah, "Look, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel, which means 'God is with us." (Matthew 1:23) The Christian Christmas and the

out of sync, not only thematically, but on the calendar as well. Christmas begins for us on December 25 (or, following the example of the Jewish form of time keeping, it can begin at sundown on the previous day, making our Christmas Eve celebrations fully in keeping with the Christian calendar) and extends a full 12 days until Epiphany on January 6.

And so, I wish you all the joys that the

Cultural Christmas has to offer, but even more I wish you all the blessings of the Christian Christmas that remind us that, through the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, God is indeed with us today and every day!

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Memorial Fund

Hello everyone, I wanted to take this opportunity to share a short note regarding the Memorial Fund at All Saints and how it has enhanced the atmosphere of the church over the years.

The fund was started over 40 years ago, as a means for both members and non members to donate money to the church in memory of a loved one. All donations made to the fund are recorded in the Memorial book, which is in the glass case near the mailboxes in the Narthex. Members should feel free to lift the glass lid and look through the book at any time.

There is also a current Memorial board that hangs above the case, as well as an older board, which hangs near the bottom of the stairs. The committee has criteria for names to be engraved on the board. The name of a loved one will be inscribed on the Memorial board if the contributions to the fund is \$500 or more with one exception. That exception is that the person being remembered was a long time contributing member of service to the church.

Over the years, the Memorial fund has provided many gifts to the congregation. This list includes, but is not limited to, the defibrillator in the Narthex, funds toward the new furnace, a new Paschal Candle and follower and LED lighting. The fund has always been supportive of music at All Saints. Early on, Memorial funds were donated by members for the organ when the building was

new. In recent years, it helped provided new songbooks for the choir, speakers/cables, handheld microphones and soloists who have enhanced our worship. The funds were also used for the resilvering of the Communion glass trays.

Additionally, the beautiful stained glass window mounted above the Ascending Christ figure, both designed by Hanna Boos, was a substantial project that the Memorial fund financed. I think we can all agree that it is a stunning enhancement to our worship space.


I hope that this has provided some helpful insight into where these various additions around the church have come from over the years. It is wonderful that donations made in memory of our loved



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We Are All Images of God

Joan Chittister, Murshid Saadi Shakur Chishti, and Rabbi Arthur Waskow, writing from their traditions of Christianity, Islam, and Judaism, believe we all share equally in God's image, even amid our joint history of violence.

All our traditions—Jewish, Christian, and Muslim—teach that the human race and every human being are created in the image of God. Rabbinic midrash says that when Caesar puts his image on a coin, each coin comes out identical—but that when the One who is beyond all rulers puts the divine image on the coin of every human being, each "coin" comes out unique....

Today, the various Caesars of our planet insist that we must fit into a single mold, the mold of uniformity and death.... The pain of these deaths and of this destruction drives some of the children of Hagar, through Ishmael, and some of the children of Sarah, through Isaac, to forget that they are all children of Abraham. That we are all children of Noah and his wife, Naamah, who suffered through the danger that human violence imposes on all who dwell on our planet....

If we are to celebrate [the Infinite God], we must in the same breath resist the idolatrous Caesars who think to impose upon us their murders. In our banks, our kindergartens, our picket lines and voting booths, as we worship in our graceful sacred buildings and in our quiet forests and on our frenzied streets, through the seasons of our joy and of our sorrow—in all these, we must remember to welcome ourselves, each other, and all who begin as strangers into the Tent that is open to all. Pastor Brian Wilker, Earlby Wakefield, and Anne Stuart attended this year's synod meeting for the Anglican Diocese of Niagara, held virtually on November 4.

In her charge to Synod, which centered on the Parable of the Talents found in Matthew 25:14–30, Bishop Susan Bell reminded congregations that "God calls us to engage in the risk of faith;

to become more and more like Christ and to live into the health and diversity of the mixed ecology – mission and tradition – the new and ancient Church."

We learned about positive endeavours across the diocese, including the Migrant Workers Program, and plans for a diocesan capital campaign. You will find a summary on the diocesan website, at https://

Well... It is almost Christmas
Day. Depending on your
circumstances, this time of year
can be a source of excitement,
gratitude, generosity and joy, or
be filled with mixed emotions,
stress, loneliness and sadness.
The image of the perfect holiday
permeates our culture, which we
then compare ourselves to, and
causes feelings of obligation,
perhaps even perfection. Trying
to please everyone around us
and keep with tradition can be
frustrating.

It is a time too of "excesses": over-eating, over-spending, over-drinking, over-indulgence. The compulsory consumerism and mandatory merriment can have a negative impact on our budgets and health, which some of us cannot afford. Remember it is OK to say "no".

Sometimes holiday traditions and gatherings can create tensions, discomfort and perhaps even conflict. Be aware that only you can do what makes you happy, which may result in stepping outside to take a "break", declining an invitation or leaving early.

The Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP)

Some brave soul recently asked me for information on the new "Canadian Dental Care Plan" that the Federal Government has announced in December this year. I will do my best to outline the highlights.

First of all, the plan is being rolled out in stages according to age. Right now the plan exists for children under the age of 12 as a Child Dental Benefit. It is intended for those who do not have access to existing dental insurance. This plan will continue until June 30, 2024 when the new plan kicks in for children. Dental expenses for these children can be claimed from July 1, 2023 to June 30,2024.

To qualify for the new CDCP, obviously you must meet all four of the requirements:

- 1. You have no access to dental insurance: this means either thru employee benefits, a pension plan, family member's benefits, your—spouse /partner benefits, or purchased by you or a family member thru a group or benefit plan..
- 2. You must have an adjusted family net income of less than \$90,000.
- 2. Be a Canadian resident for tax purposes.
- 4. Have filed a tax return in the previous year.

For Canadian residents who have access to dental care thru government social programs offered by the province or the federal government, they can still qualify for the CDCP if they meet all the eligibility requirements. Coverage will then be coordinated to ensure no duplication of services, or to avoid gaps in oral health care. Children under the age of 12 whose dental costs are fully paid by another government program with no direct cost to the parent, do not qualify.

Stages of "Rollout" for those eligible to apply:

- 1. If you are over 70, you will receive a letter with instructions on how to apply by phone, providing you are eligible according to age and income.
- 2. Starting in May 2024, if you are between 65 abd 69, and eligible, you can apply online.
- 3. Adults with a valid Disability Tax Credit certificate and children under 18 can apply starting in June 2024.

Application schedule by age group for those eligible to apply:

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1.	Seniors 87 and up	December 2023	6.	Adults with valid Disability Tax.	June 2024
2.	Seniors 77-86	January 2024	7.	Children under 18	June 2024
3.	Seniors 72-76	February 2024	8.	All remaining eligible Canadian residents	2025
4.	Seniors 70-71	March 2024			
5.	Seniors 65-69	May 2024			

Letters of application will be mailed out in the above months to those eligible. These letters will include a personalized application code and instructions on how to apply. Follow the instructions in the letter to apply by phone. Then wait for Service Canada to issue a letter confirming that you were successful and you qualify. After that you will receive a welcome package from Sun Life, telling you when you can start to get care, your member card and other information on the CDCP. After your start date, when booking an appointment with your oral care provider, make sure they have enrolled in the CDCP to avoid any out of pocket expenses. After May 2024 you will be able to apply online. Sun Life is the contracted service provider who manages the program for the Government of Canada. Once you have applied and your eligibility is confirmed, your information then will be shared with Sun Life, who will enroll you in the CDCP. Sun Life will then send you a welcome package which will include information on the Plan, your member card and the date your coverage starts.

If you do not receive a letter:

- 1. Make sure your taxes for 2022 are filed
- 2. Check to be sure your address is correct on your tax form
- 3. Letters will not be sent to those with an adjusted family net income above the qualifying limit of \$90,000.

Benefit Payments

These are administered by the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA)

- 1. Adult and senior benefits are paid according to income: under \$70,000 you get 100% of your costs covered; between \$70,000 and 79,999 it is reduced to 60%; while with \$80,000-89,999 family income, reimbursement is adjusted to 40%.
- 2. I believe your dental care costs are submitted directly to Sun Life by your care provider. However if you fall into the income categories where only a percentage is paid by the plan, you will be responsible to pay the care provider the difference.

Coverage

Services covered are somewhat basic but reasonably extensive; things like cleaning, extractions, root canal, fillings, xrays, and dentures. Some services will not be available until the fall of 2024 but you will be updated as more services become available.

By this time next year, we will all have happy, big white smiles, healthy gums and teeth. Hope this helps.

It has been another amazing year for the Silvercreek Community Market. We have one more Market on December 21 and we have already served 6,500 people this year. That is more than a thousand people over last year. We are registering new families every week, so we don't see those numbers dropping any time soon.

We have been extremely fortunate in the financial support from Community partners/friends. We would not have been able to operate so successfully without them! We would like to thank the Order of the Eastern Star for their faith in our outreach ministry and the \$14,000 they have donated to the Market in 2023. Thank you!

We were also able to get grants from the Eastern Synod (\$5,000) and ELFEC (\$2,000) for next year's Market. We have also been given another Eastern Synod grant for 2024. Again, this year the **Johanniter** Humanitarian Group has given us another generous donation (\$2,000). Thank you! Last but not least, our amazing congregation gives time, money and food to this important outreach ministry. We could not do this without all of you!

We have also been supported by St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church throughout the year with Food Drives. There is another one coming up in December. We often get a couple of hundred dollars in donations as well which we use to top up non-perishable items we are low on. Capital Paving held their Christmas party and collected 530 pounds of food for us!

We also did a food drive at Thanksgiving for the partners who meet in the building. That resulted in a \$200 donation and several bins filled with nonperishables. We thank them for their support!

We have some more exciting donation news to share but you will




need to wait until next month to read about it!


