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From the Pastor's Study

Dear Members and Friends of All Saints:

In the past few years, a number of improvements have been made to our facilities here at All Saints. Some have been done specifically to aid us in our proclamation of the gospel both within and beyond our congregational walls, such as the electronic sign at the entrance, the newly planted garden and trees, and the livestreaming equipment. Other improvements have been done to maintain and enhance our facilities, such as the flooring in the narthex and office space, the automatic doors, the new sound system, new lighting in the Rose Head Hall, and upcoming work to manage water drainage around building.

By my calculations, we have spent in excess of \$100,000 on

these improvements over the past six or seven years, money made available through the capital repair fund, memorial funds, synod and diocesan grants, and generous donations from you our members and friends. It is money that we believe is well spent as our property and facilities are fundamental to our life as a community of faith, ministry that we hope will continue for many years to come.

Just as we are diligent in our support of the sustainability of our facilities, I believe that it is time to consider our long-term sustainability as a community of faith. It is no secret that the average age of the congregation is steadily creeping upwards and that we don't have many children running around our church. These facts don't bode well for long-term sustainability.

Of course, we are not alone in this. We all know churches that have downsized or closed in recent years. Fortunately, thanks to your faithfulness, vibrancy, and generosity, we are many years away from making those kinds of difficult decisions. Still. wouldn't it be better to address these challenges now than wait until tough realities force us into difficult decisions down the road?

It is my hope that 2025 will be a year for intentional consideration of our longterm sustainability. That it will be a year for council and each of our committees to do long-term planning and visioning. That we as a

congregation might engage in a Mission Action Plan process. That we give serious thought to how we reach out to families in our area with a vision of the gospel and church that will address the reality of their lives and speak to their hopes and dreams. That we consider the cost of sustainability in dollars, time, and energy. And that we prayerfully and playfully imagine new ways of being church that honours our traditions yet crosses boundaries that we never considered before.

In the meantime, I hope that you will continue to support All Saints with your prayers, your time, and your resources. While we consider the long-term sustainability of our ministry, our building and facilities will continue to require upkeep and upgrading. Remember that offerings received in excess of the annual budget are designated for the capital repair fund up to \$10,000, which we have been shy of achieving these past few years.

Some beautiful young trees have just been planted as part of the Environmental Sustainability (Greening) project. Let us pray and work toward those trees sheltering our people for generations to come.

We are being asked to make ourselves vulnerable again, and, in doing so, make our hearts and minds fully available to the Spirit's leading. Perhaps we are called to dream differently.....That can make us feel vulnerable......But we can, and should, be confident in our vulnerability. God has made us confident in Christ and competent ministers of the gospel."

As I sit and write this, we are again on the precipice of a new chapter. I used the quote above in an article I wrote in 2017 as All Saints was coming together as a single congregation and at the time when none of us had ever imagined of the COVID pandemic years to come. We indeed have run races in the past, but this is a new one, a new opportunity as All Saints.

Pastor Brian's leadership in our year long emphasis on stewardship (All Saints in Action) has led us through the topics of Worship, Service, and now Forming Disciples. I believe that in Forming Disciples, we are called to be "fishers of men", casting out of the Word. One of reaching out to our neighbour, the nations. For some of us, this can be an uncomfortable step when done on a personal level.

Here at All Saints, the Council has been very active in maintaining and stretching that mission into our community and beyond. Some of our recent discussions and actions include:

- Assisting and planning of a multi day community arts presentation with faith, hope, and love during Easter of 2025.
- A joint fundraising pasta dinner with Eastern Star supporting Royal City Mission activities.
- Put in place a fund-raising activity involving us at Ribfest and sponsoring Royal City Missions.
- Putting in place a future plan in 2025 for All Saints proactively thinking ahead of our situation with an aging congregation and resources.
- Dealing with the expenses of an

aging building and uses which includes substantial costs to maintenance and replacement costs as well as labour costs to accommodate these increased uses.

- Successful completion of the Greening Team stage 1 proposal and possibilities of now going to a stage 2 and 3 plan.
- Capital repair fund management and demands from it.
- An ongoing budget deficit which has recently grown to about \$10,000.

All the above relates to the calling and forming of future disciples. From the list above, one can understand how this calling at All Saints creates vulnerability in that it costs money and that is a topic sometimes uncomfortably personal to each of us. We are in a way, at a new starting line in both maintaining and extending our ministries with a changing congregation. For myself, it has prompted me to reexamine both my time spent in personal contributions to the church but also my monetary contributions to support our calling. I challenge each of us to reflect on this and perhaps reexamine our contributions to our calling at All Saints.

From the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Committee

The RIC Committee at All Saints exists to engage our congregation in our call to "welcome people of any age, gender identity and expression, race, colour, and sexual orientation" as stated in our Welcome Statement. All Saints is an RIC congregation, meaning that we are affiliated with the Lutheran organization Reconciling Works and that we are committed to being an affirming congregation for the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, that we are open to calling a queer pastor/priest, and that we allow 2SLGBTOIA+ weddings to take place in our church.

Over the past few years, the All Saints RIC Committee has been striving to fulfill its mandate by offering education opportunities through workshops and Connections articles, postings on our bulletin board in the narthex, holding an annual RIC Sunday and Pride Sunday, and representing All Saints at Pride in the Park each year.

As you have probably noticed, what began as a ministry in support of our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters about 30 years ago has

expanded over the years, first to include bisexual and transgender (LGBT) folks, and now includes those who are queer/questioning, intersex, asexual, as well as people whose sexual orientations and gender identities are not explicitly spelled out in the acronym. Finally, 2S refers to Two-Spirited, which is a term used in some Indigenous cultures to describe people who embody both masculine and feminine spirits, reflecting a unique gender role in their community. Thus, 2SLGBTQIA+. For some, this may be complex and confusing.

We as a committee believe it is time to hear from you again. What are your questions for the committee? There has been a lot in the news lately, including a lot of misinformation, about youth who may be considering or have begun the process of transitioning their gender. There has been a lot of news coverage lately, including a lot of misinformation, about youth who want to use a different name or pronoun at school than that which their parents assigned them at



birth. Why would they want to do that? Should they be allowed to do so without their parent's consent? Why might it be physically and psychologically dangerous to the child to inform the parents in many cases?

At some point early in the new year, the RIC Committee will be inviting you to participate in a Congregational Forum about what it means to be an affirming congregation these days, and what questions you might have. To help us prepare for this forum, we invite you to submit your questions, thoughts, and experiences to us through Pastor Brian's email (pastorbwilker@gmail.com), or by speaking with any of the committee members.



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PWRDF — New Name!

After almost two years of listening together and planning, **PWRDF** has chosen a new name. The new name was approved at a Special Members meeting held Tuesday, October 15, 4 p.m. ET, in accordance with our corporate bylaws.



In 2022, we selected a Task Team of staff, board members and volunteers from across Canada. This team gathered on Zoom with the goal of identifying a compelling name – a name that better reflects our work, and one that would sustain our work into the future. In these and other discussions with stakeholders and staff, one dominant theme emerged: **partnership**.

PWRDF is all about partnerships. In fact the former Primate, Archbishop Fred Hiltz, used to say the "P" in PWRDF could have easily stood for partners.

We partner with local organizations who carry out the work that you support – life-giving work that improves food security, champions gender rights, provides training on conservation agriculture, and creates income opportunities.

We partner with membership organizations that allow us to be part of a larger network. These include the Anglican Alliance, the ACT Alliance, the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, KAIROS, Cooperation Canada, among others.

We partner with funding agencies including Global Affairs Canada, businesses and a growing number of private and family foundations.

We partner with the Anglican Church of Canada, Anglican dioceses, spiritual ministries and ecclesiastical provinces, through their bishops and their PWRDF Representatives, who support our programs and invite us to spread the good news of PWRDF at synods and other meetings.

We partner with parish representatives, clergy and countless volunteers in the pews across the country, who share our stories and engage others in our work.

We partner with our generous donors, without whose support none of our partners' work would be possible.

This theme of partnership or accompaniment is woven throughout the Bible, but the task team was drawn to the story of the road to Emmaus. Days after Jesus died, the disciples were walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus, still grieving their loss. As Luke writes, the resurrected Jesus came alongside them, but they did not know it was him. Jesus travelled with them and then accepted their hospitality to dine with them. In the breaking of bread, their eyes were opened and they recognized him. When we walk alongside one another, Jesus accompanies us. We are strengthened and comforted and recognize Jesus when we share in his feast.

As we walk alongside each of our partners, supporting, listening and sharing with one another, we embrace and embody the hope of a better world. Thus was born our new name:

Alongside Hope: Anglicans and partners working for change in Canada and around the world

It is a name that will carry us forward into the future.





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Climate Conversations - Where's the beef?

We had a wonderful discussion on Sunday October 20 after the service.
One of the suggestions that came up was eating less beef. People are often confused by this – why not just eat less meat of any kind (and this is good too!)? Why specifically beef?


To answer that you need to know about some of the other atmospheric gases that contribute to global warming and climate change. Water vapour, carbon dioxide (CO_2) , methane (CH_4) , nitrous oxide (N_2O) and fluorocarbon gases are the main greenhouse gases. The first four are all naturally occurring, the last is man-made (i.e. refrigerants etc.). Humans don't have too much impact on water vapour - that is more part of global weather systems. And we are more aware of the impact of CO₂. But methane does not draw the same attention and it should because it is 28 times more potent as a greenhouse gas than CO₂. That means for the same volume of gas, methane has 28 times the heat retention capacity. And methane stays there for at least 12 years after it enters the atmosphere - so again for the same volume of gas the heating capacity of methane is about 80 times that of CO₂ while it stays in the atmosphere. That means CO₂ may last in the atmosphere longer, but methane makes it warmer faster. Our methane emission could be easier to reduce quickly compared to CO₂ if we change what we eat.

So where's the beef? The largest sources of methane that humans account for are

agriculture, fossil fuels and landfill sites. Methane does occur naturally (about 40%) – wetlands, decomposing organic materials etc. all create methane. About 60% of methane released into the atmosphere is from human activities – and beef farming is the largest producer of agricultural methane (rice farming is the other big one, but much less than ranching).

A single cow produces between 154 to 264 pounds of methane gas per year. Not counting for the emissions of any other livestock, 1.5 billion cattle, raised specifically for meat production worldwide, emit at least 231 billion pounds of methane into the methane into the atmosphere each year. (https://climate.nasa.gov/vital-signs/methane)


Cows burp. That releases methane. When I covered this topic in Science class it always caused a huge laugh (because it not



reported last year that 800 million trees were cut down between 2017 and 2023 in the Amazonian rainforest (mainly Brazil). In addition, these ranchers often burn trees before or after they are cut down to clear the land for grass to grow. Growing trees take CO_2 out of the atmosphere, so when

they are cut down we lose a natural carbon sink, plus if they are burned, more CO₂ is added to the atmosphere. And the soil in this region is not very deep and the grasslands don't yield as much grass after a few years – so more ranch land is constantly being developed. It's a cycle. Most of that beef is also exported so add in the CO₂ that is created by shipping to North America etc. Areas that are abandoned after being used as grasslands often do not recover well, so the world is not getting a new



Amazon rainforest to soak up CO_2 any time soon. And we don't just ranch cattle in South America, beef cattle are raised in Canada too!

One way to reduce our personal impact on global warming immediately is to stop/reduce buying beef. Scientists are working on ways to reduce cow flatulence with breeding (genetics), different diets etc. but burping methane will never completely disappear! And while rice farming also creates methane (it resembles a wetland) the amount of rice/methane produced is much less than equivalent beef/methane farming.

The people of Lebanon need your help

To date, more than 2,000 people in Lebanon have lost their lives to violence, and many thousands more have been displaced. Today, after the Government of Canada announcement of a **special matching fund**, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and Canadian Lutheran World Relief invite you to pray for those suffering and to give generously in response to this crisis.

Schools turned into shelters are filling up with people sleeping on the floor without pillows or blankets, or even water to drink.
